Of course, we have lost a few along the way. However, we have also gained some. Following is a summary of our membership numbers as of December 30, 2019:

35 Chapters in 3 Districts

4 State Honorary Members, 16 Chapter Honorary Members

51 Reserve Members

920 Active Members

991 Total Members

When taking into account our Active and Reserve Members, we were actually down by just one member compared to the end of 2018. When we keep in mind that one chapter has officially dissolved since then and another entire chapter did not pay dues, I am encouraged by the fact that only one net member was lost from December 2018 to December 2019! I hope this tidbit encourages you as well!

In closing, I want to let you know a few of the action items from our Executive Board Meeting on February 22.

A revised 2019-2021 MSO budget was accepted.

A Grant in Aid was funded and awarded.

The Clytee Evans Scholarship was funded and awarded.

The MSO Emergency Fund award was increased from \$200 to \$250.

Lynn Holliday, MSO Treasurer, and Linda Lightsey, MSO Executive Secretary, were re-elected for 2020-2024.

The date and location for our 2021 MSO Convention were approved—April 16-17, 2021, at the Courtyard by Marriott in Gulfport.

This was not part of my District Meeting message, but my prayers are always with each of you, especially in times such as these. Grant-in-Aid Awards... Chris Wall, Professional Affairs

The Zeta State Grant-in-Aid Award is presented annually to a female resident of Mississippi who will be an incoming senior for the upcoming fall semester after the award is presented. She exhibits an aptitude for and desire to pursue a career in the field of education. The recipient is awarded \$750.00. Each applicant's ratings are based upon criteria set forth in the *Zeta State Grant-in-Aid Award Guidelines*. It is the Educational Excellence Committee who serves as the reviewers of the applications using a rubric provided in the Zeta State Grant-in-Aid Award Application to determine the award winner.

Eight Zeta State Grant-in-Aid applications were submitted for 2020! Those chapters were: **Northern District** – Eta, Alpha Iota, and Alpha Psi; **Central District** – Beta, Gamma and Pi; and in the **Southern District** Alpha Gamma and Alpha Theta.

If a chapter provided a Grant-in-Aid award, but did not recommend their recipient for the state award, the chapter submitted a Grant-in-Aid Report (Form 11) to document their effort in order to meet honor chapter criteria requirements. 21 out of 35 chapters submitted Grant-in-Aid Reports. Those chapters were: **Northern District** – Alpha, Eta, Iota, Upsilon, Alpha Delta, Alpha Iota, Alpha Kappa, Alpha Phi and Alpha Psi; **Central District** – Beta, Gamma, Theta, Lambda, Pi, and Beta Alpha; and in the **Southern District** Sigma, Psi, Alpha Gamma, Alpha Theta, Alpha Rho, and Alpha Upsilon. SUPPORT OF EARLY CAREER EDUCATORS AT AN ALL TIME HIGH

Congratulations to all our Mississippi State Organization Chapters who volunteered to mentor, assist, and encourage our Early Career Educators. Ninety-two percent of MSO Chapters documented volunteer hours this year, with a state total of 9,800 hours. Our records indicate the number of volunteer hours continues to increase!

The Northern District logged 3,449 hours with Eta Chapter recording the most hours. The Central District recorded 975 hours with Xi Chapter leading the district. The Southern District submitted the most volunteer hours for a total of 5,376 hours! Two Southern District chapters played a significant role in our success. The largest total was submitted by Alpha Upsilon Chapter with Alpha Gamma Chapter in a close finish.

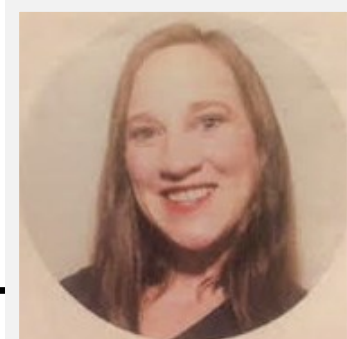
